Isn't our church beautiful? And then you see the ugly sign in the forefront – a reminder of what we are facing right now. We will survive this bump but please read the following note from our church treasurer – it is so very, very important in the life of our church.

“Our world has been considerably disrupted. Among other things, we are having church services via a Zoom video communications platform. This makes passing the plate to receive offerings impossible. Unfortunately, we still must pay bills, employee salaries, etc. And we have a \$4500 infrastructure improvement that will begin as soon as weather allows: adding a paved handicap parking pad to the back parking lot and replacing/repairing the cracked, sloping sidewalk to the back door of the church. This means that we must urge you to remain faithful to your financial commitment to MCC. This can be done by mailing a check to the church or by going to the church website (<http://millersburgchristianchurch.org/>) and clicking on the "Donate" tab at the top of the page. This will take you to a secure, PayPal page where you can donate by either a deduction from your PayPal account or by using a credit card. Thank You!” – Jeff Moran

Since activities at the church have been postponed for the next few weeks, we are trying to adapt to new situations. Sunday, March 22, we had our first on-line worship service, and it seemed to work out well. 23 people gathered via a Zoom video communications platform, and we could see and hear Rev Patricia's sermon, as well as the joys and concerns, music, sharing of communion, and benediction. We expect to be doing this for a while.

So, for those of you who did not participate in this first service, here is the procedure for joining us in other services or accessing the recorded service on line:

1) Prior to the Sunday worship service, Bob Green will send an email to members and friends of the church with a link to the Zoom meeting (church service); click on that link and follow the instructions; it is OK if you forward Bob Green's email to other friends and family that might be interested; you will be able to sign in to the meeting 30 minutes or so before the 10:30am meeting "start" time.

2) Listen to and participate in the worship experience until the end of the session, about 11:30.

3) The worship service will be recorded. If you, or someone you have invited, or someone else who just wants to see/hear the service but has missed it, Jeff Moran will convert the Zoom recording into a YouTube video and upload it. He will make it a "private" video, meaning that someone will have to have the link to that particular video in order to access it. He will create a Facebook post on the MCC Facebook page that contains that link, and all you have to do is click on that link in order to view the entire worship service.

4) The YouTube video link will also be published on the church website (<http://millersburgchristianchurch.org/>); just go to that page and click on the "Sermons" tab at the top of the page; this will take you to a new page that will have all of the Zoom meetings listed by date.

Patricia's Ponderings



Fear. If you're feeling it, you're normal. You're paying attention. The coronavirus is an invader that has come upon us with great speed and virulence, and not to fear would be a grave mistake. We must protect ourselves and others by practicing social isolation. These are the facts. As with an invader during wartime, fear can be a help. Yes, fear – that bugaboo that normally creates all kinds of mischief - has an upside. There are times when fear serves as a protector, and this is one of those times.

But we need to keep our fears in check so that panic does not set in. When fear loses its rational, factual moorings, we start doing irrational things like buying up all the toilet paper in the known universe, which of course makes no sense in the case of a respiratory illness. We forget to share, to make sure our neighbor has enough. Panic turns healthy fear into an ugly contagion - and we have enough of that for the moment, thank you very much.

It's okay to be afraid, but we need to balance our fears with faith, hope, and love—especially love. (1 Corinthians 13). During this time, we will suffer from the lack of social interaction and from the deprivations of simple touch, hand shaking, and hugging. But we can also find ways to transform this temporary time of isolation. As for me, I'm taking time to learn a new instrument. When I'm practicing and learning new fingerings on my guitar, the world and all its troubles disappears. What is your hobby? This is a good time to throw yourself into it.

We can also explore novel ways of interacting. One of the ways we are doing this at MCC is by practicing online church. We are meeting on Sunday mornings at our regular time through ZOOM. A new door of connection and community has opened for us - a fresh adventure amid a crisis. (I hope you will join us!)

Fear is not my favorite spiritual companion, but it has its place. We can keep fear in its place - avoiding the contagion of panic - by discovering new adventures over the next few weeks: a new hobby, a new technology, and the simple old-fashioned gift of talking on the phone. Texting is good, but there's nothing like the human voice when life gets scary.

God is with us, sharing our anxieties and offering our fears a pathway lined with all the things we need to survive this crisis: compassion, caring for the most vulnerable, novel ways to connect, solitude for prayer, and, maybe even some new adventures along the way.

May you be healthy. May you be safe. Peace be with you.

New LED Chandelier Sanctuary Lights

MCC would like to thank Bill and John Bright (Bright Electric) for the upgrades made to the 4 sanctuary chandelier lights. The lights have been in the church for many years and the sockets had become brittle and were breaking. For this electrical upgrade, each chandelier had to be taken down to install the new sockets, so it was quite a job and required a 16-foot ladder! At the same time, it was decided to switch the chandelier bulbs to LED lights which are much brighter and will last substantially longer than the incandescent bulbs we'd been using and which required Bill Anderson to climb up on a high ladder which was dangerous. Bill Anderson, Danny Rose and Stan Adams changed out the old light switches for the new upgrade. The new LED lights are a huge improvement, adding much needed brighter/white light to an aging congregation or those with vision problems.

Years ago, to save on energy, the Property Committee installed CFL bulbs, but they take a while to "warm up" and unfortunately are a more yellow low light too. To help light the pulpit area more, a single soft white LED bulb was bought and exchanged with the CFL. This helped Rev. Patricia and we were able to remove the piano light that had been providing extra light for her. Perhaps in the future we can replace the other 10-14 spiral CFL bulbs with the LED but they are a little over \$8/each. The Property Committee would like to thank Millersburg's **Jones Farm, Home and Auto Store** for carrying an extensive line of products to help our church on a moment's notice. It's great not having to drive to Columbia or Fulton!

On a "Green" side note regarding recycling of light bulbs, Batteries Plus on Grindstone in Columbia recycles light bulbs and batteries. Depending upon the bulb, some are free, others a small fee but such a good thing for our environment. Rita & Stan recycle the church bulbs there.

April – I have not put activities on calendar due to the uncertainty of when public gatherings will be held again. I will be sure to notify all when that happens!
